Viral Exanthem

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- Exanthem (exanthema)
 - Rash that appears abruptly and affects several areas of the skin simultaneously
 - ► Greek origin (exanthema) which means a breaking out
- Enanthem (enanthema)
 - An eruption upon a mucous membrane

- Morbiliform which means composed of erythematous macules and papules that resemble a measles rash
- Difficult to distinguish from drug eruption

- Macule < 1cm & Patch > 1cm
- Papule < 1cm & Plaque > 1cm
- Nodule small/deep & Tumor big
- Petechiae < 3mm & Purpura > 3mm
- Vesicle < 1cm & Bullae > 1cm
- Pustule = pus
- Wheel = comes and goes
- Enanthem = MM + Exanthema

- Measles (first disease)
- Scarlet fever (second disease)
- Rubella (third disease)
- Dukes Disease (fourth disease)
- Erythema Infectiosum (fifth disease)
- Exanthum subitem (sixth disease)








Measles

- Incubation 10 days
- Symptoms: prodromal symptoms such as fever, <u>conjunctivitis</u> and <u>coryza</u>, <u>cough</u>, photophobia
- Signs: non-pruritic erythematous macules and papules in a patterned distribution with a cephalocaudal spread, Koplick Spots(early).
- Contagious 4 days prior to the rash till 4 days after eruption of the rash
- Spread: droplet

Measles

- Complications:
 - CNS
 - Gestational
 - Pneumonia
 - Ophthalmic
- Treatment :
 - 1- vitamin A
 - 2- IVIg
 - 3- Vaccination





Rubella (German Measles)


- Incubation 14-21 days, winter and spring
- Symptoms: malaise, headache, sore throat, coryza
- Signs: starts with tender lymphadenopathy, then 1-5 days post prodromal symptoms develop Discrete Pink/Red Fine Maculopapular, Starts on Face, Spreads cephalocaudal, Rapid spread, clears in 2-3 days.
- Spread: Droplet

Rubella (German Measles)

- Complications:
 - ► Congenital; First trimester highest risk of teratogenicity, last trimester highest risk of infection.
- Treatment:
 - Supportive.
 - Immunize







Varicella (Chickenpox)

- ► Incubation: 10-21 days
- Symptoms: Fever, Headache, Malaise
- Signs: 1-2 days post prodromal symptoms, rapid appearance of Tiny Erythematous Papules changes to Vesicles with red Halos, Pruritic.
- Spread: Airborne

Varicella (Chickenpox)

- Complications
 - Secondary bacterial infections
 - **▶**Pneumonia
 - **CNS**
- ▶ Gestation
 - Risk of teratogenicity if in the first half of pregnancy.


Varicella (Chickenpox)

- ▶ Treatment:
 - ► Antiviral therapy if early, consider presumptive therapy
 - Avoid
 - Immunize
- Exposure:
 - ► Give prophylaxis (Varicella IVIg) if exposure to:
 - ▶ Immunocompromised patient.
 - ▶ Neoborn with infected mothers
 - Premature, Very low birth weight.
 - ▶ Within 4 days of exposure.









Hand-Foot-Mouth (Coxsackie)

- Incubation: 4 to 6 days.
- Coxsackie virus mostly, might be from Enterovirus, Echovirus
- Symptoms: Fever, Malaise, Sore Mouth, Anorexia.
- Signs: Oral Shallow Yellow Ulcers with Red Halos and Oval shaped vesicles with erythematous halos.
- Might involve buttocks
- Complications: Aseptic meningitis, Myo/Pericarditis
- Treatment: Supportive.







Erythema Infectiosum

- Incubation: 1 to 2 weeks, due to Parvo virus B19
- Symptoms: Fever, Myalgias, Headache, Usually 4 to 10 years of age.
- Signs: Confluent erythematous edematous plaques on the cheeks with erythematous reticular eruption on the trunk and extremities
- Resolves in 5 to 10 days ,Rash can recur with heat and sun exposure months after infection
- Spread : Saliva
- Mostly infectious before the rash
- Complications:
 - Chronic Hemolytic anemia
 - Aplastic crisis
- Treatment: Supportive, IVIg?







Infectious Mononucleosis

- Incubation period: 1-2 months
- Symptoms: fever, sore throat, fatigue, malaise.
- Signs: lymphadenopathy, splenomegaly, enlarged tonsils, Diffuse maculopapular,
 Palatal Petechiae.
- Investigation: VCA-IgM
- Complications:
 - Malignancy
- Treatment:
 - Supportive.
 - Steroids.
 - Avoid Sports.







Warts

- Incubation: ? Weeks
- Caused By Papilloma virus
- Symptoms: usually subclinical
- Signs: Hyperkeratonic Papule With Rough Irregular Surface On Fingers/Hands/Feet, genital in older age group
- Complications:
 - Malignancy in Genital Warts
- Treatment: Removal If Symptomatic





Molluscum Contagiosum

- Incubation: 7 weeks
- Symptoms: Itching
- Signs: Sharply Circumscribed Single/Multiple Dome-Shaped Papules with waxy surfaces, usually with umbilicated centers.
- Spread: direct contact, self-infection
- Treatment: Removal If Symptomatic. Usually resolves In 2-3 Years without scaring






Roseola Infantum (Exanthem subitem)

- Caused By: human herpes virus 6
- Most common before the age of 2 years
- Symptoms: High grade fever, febrile convulsions, followed by rash
- Signs: Pink macules and papules surrounded by white halo
- Rash Starts on the trunk and spreads
- Complications: Seizures
- Treatment: Supportive







Dengue Fever

- Incubation period : 1-7 days
- Symptoms: fever (biphasic), myalgia, arthralgia, nausea and vomiting, can present with hemorrhage or shock.
- Signs: Infectious thrombocytopenic purpura, red widespread maculopapular rash (white islands on red sea) spares the palms and soles
- Spread: mosquito borne.
- Complications:
 - ▶ DIC
- Treatment: supportive





Monkeypox (Mpox)

- Incubation: 3 weeks
- Symptoms: flu like, fever, chills, headache
- Signs: itchy tender skin rash, papular, multiple stages, lymphadenopathy.
- Spread : direct contact, contagious 4 days prior to rash eruption
- Complications:
 - Secondary infections
 - Pneumonia
- Treatment : Supportive
